Last Week's Meeting

Kevin Beltrame introduced Warren Bond who is the Chairman of the Eastern District of Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS). Prior to a review of the RAWCS operations in 2004, the organisation lost its partial accreditation with AUSAIDE, losing a stream of government funding. The review found a number of governance issues that caused the loss of accreditation and appointed a full-time administrator to address the issues. The review also examined the Vision and Purpose of RAWACS to ensure a focus on improving lives and relieving suffering. The administrator has not solved the governance issues and funding to support the position is not available until accreditation with AUSAIDE is re-established. The Eastern Region has seven Rotary Districts and is satisfying the governance issues identified, however the other Regions have prevented the regaining of AUSAIDEe accreditation. A list of RAWACS'^s current projects is being developed and will be available within the next month. The list will be made available to all Clubs via the International Service Director. Warren was thanked by Peter Foss on behalf of the Club.

Euro English
