### Last Week's Meeting

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Kevin Beltrame introduced Bill Carney, a fellow member of the Club and current Mayor of Strathfield Council. Bill has not had the opportunity to speak to the Club about himself and used the opportunity for a Job Talk.

Bill comes from a family of Solicitors and completed his Law Degree in 1982. After a brief stint with Commercial Law, Bill worked with Legal Aid then moved into Personal Injury Law. The NSW Government changed the Personal Injury Law a few years ago, making that part of the Law Industry far less rewarding. The State Government's attack on lawyers in changing this law further degraded the standing of lawyers in the community. The Law is no different to other industries with a few bad practitioners degrading the generally good behaviour of the many. An average barrister receives a salary of \$75,000 per year, compared to the average salary of \$50,000 per year. Bill moved into Local Government a few years ago as an attempt to help the community. He quoted his wife Myra as being more effective in

achieving Council action than he ever could. Bill has three children, and his wife Myra has lived in Strathfield all her life. Bill was thanked by Ray M<sup>c</sup>Cluskie on behalf of the Club.

112/2001 Cameron High School, Alotau, Milne Bay Province, PNG. 2 storey block of 4 classrooms. Not suitable for women.

01/2003-4 Tenderfoot Self Help School and Sponsorship of Needy Children, Kangemi Slum, Nairobi, Kenya. RC of Emerald and District (D9810) supports through sponsorship the ongoing basis nursery and primary education, homely skills and love to children in extremely difficult circumstances. - 14/2005-6 Hospital Renovation, Vila Central Hospital, Vanuatu. Major improvements to the hospital including extensions to Emergency Ward, construction of additional Operating Theatre, construction of Waiting Room, construction of Gatehouse Security Quarters and more. All building skills required, 50 teams of 12 maximum.
- 15/2005-6 West Timor Remote Area Home lighting, West Timor. The supply and installation of photovoltaic lighting systems to homes in various village locations. Installation is simple, approximately 2 hours per unit. General handy persons with carpentry skills and training skills required. 4 teams of 4 persons.
- 16/2005-6 Rebuilding permanent homes in Paravaipet, Pondicherry, India. To rebuild 44 permanent homes, including provision of clean water and sanitation in tsunami damaged Village. - 18/2005-6 Computer Literacy and ESL, North East Sri Lanka. (AP 024/05). To introduce a curriculum of English as a Second Language and Computer Literacy for Grades 1 & 2 children in poor village schools. The program includes curriculum development, teacher training and supply of computers and software.
- 19/2005-6 Provision of medical supplies and basic educational stationery, Menari, PNG. Urgently needed medical provisions are required in village along the Kokoda track. A trained medical assistant in a village of 3000 desperately needs supplies and equipment. Funding only.
- 20/2005-6 Construction the Australian Medical Clinic, Nias, Indonesia. (AP 016/05). A number of small teams will be required to organise the construction of this new clinic requiring rebuilding since the tsunami.
- 21/2005-6 Repairs and Rebuilding Classrooms at Eroro Primary School, PNG. 2 -3 teams of builders with carpentry skills needed urgently to needed to assist with this project to up-grade very poor school facility for 287 children. Suitable for women .
- 23/2005-6 The supply of a safe water system to two villages, Mando Village No1 and Mando Village No 2, Eastern Highlands Province, PNG. The installation of a holding tank and pipe work to each village and the provisions of stand pipes for community access. 3 teams of up to 10 volunteers with general handy-persons skills. OK for women volunteers
- 24/2005-6 Solar Lights Project, Emira and Gleno Provinces, East Timor -the purchase, supply and installation of solar powered equipment, lighting and batteries for housing and community centres. Project includes the training of village service people to maintain installations. Handyman skills required
- 25/2005-6 Babanga Island Development Program Gizo, Western Province, Solomon Islands A five year program developed and managed by the RC Brisbane Planetarium. A building program has been scheduled which includes a classroom and rest house initially. Other work will follow. Skills required are builders, plumbers, education, library, management and administration advisors.
- 26/2005-6 Nasarawaqa Indian School Library & Learning Centre, Labasa, Fiji. Set up school Library, implement systems and training of school staff. Teachers, librarians and trainers required. OK for women.
- 27/2005-6 Rotaplast program, La Oroya, Peru. Two volunteers from Hamilton, D9670, to support Rotoplast team of reconstructive and corrective surgery for cleft lips and palates.
- 28/2005-6 Vatakasara Village, Coral Coast, Viti Levu, Fiji -completion of community buildings in various stage of development, including kindergarten and community hall. Provision of water tanks. 4 teams of up to 8 people per year including builders, electricians and plumbers. Some restriction on women as volunteers will live and eat with villagers.
- 29/2005-6 Building School at Barangay Merville, Parananque, Philippines -to acquire land and build a school to cater initially for students aged 7 to 13 with sufficient land to allow for future expansion. The school, once erected, will be suitable for adult education in the evenings. All general building trades required. OK for women.
- 30/2005-6 IMOG -International Infancy, Midwifery, Obstetrics and Gynaecology Aid Programme for Maliana, Bobonara District, Timor Leste. Initially to prepare facilities to establish the IMOG programme in Maliana which involves completion/renovation of an existing shell of a building within the hospital grounds. All building skills required and very significant
- 31/2005-6 ShelterBox Australia (RC of Endeavour Hills, D 9820) To provide personnel to accompany ShelterBoxes to their destination and to ensure appropriate reception in the disaster area. Teams are known as 4R teams (Rotary, Reconnaissance, Return, Report) and all team members must hold a current First Aid Certificate.
- 32/2005-6 Building a Pre-School, Port Vila, Vanuatu -to a build a new, Christian Pre-school to provide two classes, English and French, to prepare children for formal education. Children will be taught by trained Early Childhood Educators. Funding has been provided by churches of different mainstream denominations in Australia. Builders, plumbers, electricians, etc., required. OK for women.
- 33/2005-6 Water supply, Kemabolo Village, Rega District, Central Province, PNG The supply and construction of a 195000 litre prefabricated tank, with water collected from 3 recently constructed school buildings. Basic building, plumbing and assembly skills required. Tough for women.
- 34/2005-6 Water supply and refurbish School and Health Clinic, Motolava, Torba Province, Vanuatu. Refurbishment of existing Health Dispensary Clinic by extending the Maternity Ward and Laboratory, refurbishment of 3 existing primary schools and the extension, by 2.5 Kms, of the water supply to the village and schools. Builders, plumbers, electricians etc in teams of up to 10 personnel. OK for women.

The centre is established and expanding to provide early warning to local residents along the coast of Sri Lanka that was damaged by the last Tsunami. It is linked with the Indian Ocean Warning Centres that are being established in other countries. Project for funding only. OK for Tsunami funds.
- 37/2005-6 Water Filtration for Baan Seaw School, Thailand (AP 028/06). Funding to provide water purification filters in schools in Thailand. An RI WCS Project. Project for funding only by the Rotary Club of Kiama
- 38/2005-6 Renovation of two staff houses at Dam, Western Province, PNG. Restoration of an existing building to make accommodation for two staff of Callan Services for the Disabled. Two teams of 4, carpenters, plumbers, painters
- 39/2005-6 Building of two staff houses, Kiunga, Western Province, PNG the building of 2 staff houses (duplex), 3 bedrooms, living room/kitchen,

toilet and shower, with a separate building for a laundry. Timber framing, 'Colorbond' walls, plywood linings and ceilings, vinyl tiles. Three teams of five, carpenters, electricians, plumbers and painters.
