Last Week's Meeting

Paul Giammarco, Introduced

Our special guest speaker **Nicholas Smith**, a student from St.Patricks' College Strathfield.

Nicholas was nominated by our Club to attend the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) and the following is his experience in his own words.

In the January summer holidays I was to embark upon the most exiting two weeks of my life, which is in the National Youth Science Forum. The National Youth Science Forum was held in Canberra in two, two week sessions and was the result of collaboration between such organisations as the Australian National University and Rotary Australia. It brought together over 200 senior students from right across Australia with the addition of international exchange students from such countries as Sweden, New Zealand, Canada and South Africa.

The forum opened at the Shine Dome at the Australian National University where we had the pleasure of being in the presence number of Australia's leading scientists from the Academy of Science. They spoke of a need for young aspiring Australians to fill the frightening shortage of scientists in the country, and he need for us to lead and shape Australia's promising scientific future. It was in listening to these scientists that desire to enter a career in science become even stronger.

The opening addresses were to set the scene for the rest of the forum. I was placed in a biochemistry interest group and during the forum we were given a glimpse of what a career in this field may offer us. We visited such sites around Canberra as the pathology unit at Calvary Hospital we were given a tour of the mortuary, we were treated to such gruesome sites as preserved forearms, livers and skeletons. While we were there, we were also given a rather graphic lesson on the effect a life time of heavy dinking and smoking can do to livers and lung, through the use of preserved specimens.

This was not all, we also had the privilege of a tour through the John Curtin School of Medical Research at ANU where we met the esteemed immunologist Professor Gordon Ada who discussed his vast experiences in his field which included his work in mentoring the Nobel laureate Dr Peter Doherty. We also visited the Histology department, where we were treated to a number of free microscope slides containing human tissues such as the spleen, skin and liver, souvenirs which I am certain I will never be offered again. Also at ANU we visited BaMBi, The Biochemistry and Molecular Biology Institute, where through the most advanced forensics technology where we were asked to decipher a hypothetical murder, where a woman was killed in her flat, where the possibilities include her 'pizza boy', ex-husband and her current boyfriend (for the sake of your curiosity, the murderer did turn out to be the 'pizza boy'). These locations and many more did give me a taste of what a career in biochemistry would be like

and to tell you the truth, I was more than impressed. A career in this field of Australian science did appear to be brimming with activity.

You would have been wrong to believe that the National Youth Science Forum was entirely composed of laboratory tours as much of the forum was devoted to cultivating the skills and opinions of the students. There were a number of forums held on topical issues in science such as nuclear energy, climate change and biotechnology. Guest specialists in the field were invited to speak and afterwards the students were offered the opportunity to voice their opinions on the issue, some often heated debates ensued. We were also given the opportunity to participate in a mock job interview, and lectured on such subjects as body language, negotiation skills and public speaking. In light of the years ahead of us we were spoken to by a number of university and corporate representatives, which also furthered my knowledge on which universities I would wish to study at and where I might consider working. We also were given the chance to see many of the significant sites around Canberra as Parliament House, Government House, the Australian Institute of Sport and the botanical gardens. It would be true to say that I could have never guessed that two weeks in Canberra could be so busy and so tiring. My two weeks at the National Youth Science Forum were probably the most enlightening and remarkable of my life, allowing me to gauge a career in science and decide on a path in the more recent future in terms of a university. I would also like to stress that my time in the National Youth Science Forum would have not of been possible without the constant support from Strathfield Rotary at the very beginning in selecting me to participate in the district interviews, I would like to give you my sincerest thanks.
