The Taylor's World Cruise Issue 2May 24th At Sea.Hi everyone,

First off thanks to the many of you emailing me back, including my favourite (MB) who kindly points out my typo's and spelling mistakes. Today, after 7 days at sea we are finally in Indonesian waters, passing through the Lombok Straight (next to Bali) on our way to Singapore, where we will arrive on Sunday.

The temperature has steadily increased as we have moved northward, with nights now around $24 - 26^{\circ}$ C and days around $30 - 31^{\circ}$ C. We have had sunny skies, light winds, and slight seas the whole trip so far. Tuesday was a port day in Darwin NT, Australia's fastest growing city. The waterfront area is all new with large safe swimming areas (no crocs or stingers) and lots of restaurants and cafes. We like many others reprovisioned and picked up a few missing essential that had been forgotten. After shopping we explored the Darwin museum with its great Cyclone Tracey display, and visited the Aviation Heritage museum, home to a massive B52D bomber, a Sabre, a Mirage, a B25 Mitchell, a Cobra gunship, and a great Spitfire replica.

We had lunch at Cullen Bay, which was a disappointment as it certainly is no longer the vibrant place it was, I guess due to the new water front development in town.

We have settled into shipboard life well, doing 5 laps of the deck before brekky, and 5 laps before dinner. We have been to shows, port talks, the spa for a facial (Denise only of course) and I am doing a photography course, so we are keeping busy and active and also climbing lots of stairs every day.

Our dinner companions (besides our friends Norm and Sandy) are Ray and Barbara, a couple in their sixties who have been cruising CONTINUOUSLY since September last year, after selling their home in Hobart. Why you say?.... well at \$65 a day each, it's cheaper by far than staying in a hotel or motel, and at that price they get 3 meals, free internet, free washing, and transport. Ray has had bypass surgery, and has a brain tumour, while Barbara is slowly recovering from a debilitating stroke affecting her left side. Ray is a man of humble origins, but unfortunately a big ego, and is fond of boasting about how many Captains dinners he has attended, and how he is the No. 1 cruiser on this ship.

Our patience with Ray's manner is slowly being tested. Watch this space for future episodes to this story.

In other news I have become a computer advice person, helping some passengers (including our neighbor's) connect to the net, and providing iPad advice. Over 150 people attended an iPad gathering yesterday. Well its now late afternoon, time to go and change for dinner, then go and have a cocktail in the wheelhouse bar, enjoy a nice meal with our friends (and Ray and Barbara) and then off to a production show in the theatre.
