## **Rotary Strengthens Plenary Speakers Roster**

This year's convention has quite diverse and exciting groups of speakers. And the names keep rolling in. Mwila Chigaga and Ramkumar Raju committed last week to speak at the convention, joining a roster that already includes a former Australian cricket star and the founder of the World Toilet Organization, among others.

Chigaga is a former Rotary Peace Fellow and senior regional gender specialist for the African region of the United Nations International Labour Organization. She helps create programs for women to facilitate equal access to

opportunities. In an interview, Chigaga breaks down these programs, and how her life's work "fits in perfectly" with who she is as a person.

Also check out with Chigaga where she opens up more broadly about Africa and the effects of the recent global financial crisis.

Meanwhile, Raju is a Rotaract representative from Rotary District 3230 in India and a member of the Rotaract Club of Madras Central, Tamil Nadu. Raju helped form a team last year that gathered 10,000 Rotaractors for the Presidential New Generations Conference held in Chennai. He writes about the experience for Rotary Voices.

Rotary to challenge Oprah Winfrey's Sydney Harbour Bridge climb to raise funds to eradicate polio worldwide.



It will be raining records on the Sydney Harbour Bridge when Rotarians from all over the world challenge existing marks for flying flags from the spans on May 30.

While they're at it, Oprah Winfrey's BridgeClimb record for the most simultaneous climbers is also set to fall when more than 392 members of Rotary take the climb to raise funds for the global humanitarian organization's top philanthropic goal of eradicating polio worldwide.

Rotary has partnered with BridgeClimb, which is donating 50 per cent of all ticket sales from the May 30 record attempts to Rotary's End Polio Now campaign.

BridgeClimb CEO Todd Coates said they will be honoured to share the iconic experience of Climbing the Sydney Harbour Bridge with Rotary World Convention visitors, and to make a significant contribution to the global Rotary effort to end Polio forever.

"The unceasing dedication by Rotary's 1.2 million members over almost three decades is a testament to a commitment and determination to achieve excellence in positive outcomes, two qualities that BridgeClimb has fostered from the moment of its own inception," Mr. Coates said.

The world record for the number of different flags and the number of flags flown from a bridge currently stands at 137 and was set on a BridgeClimb on October 1, 2008.

Oprah Winfrey took a record 316 guests to the top of the arch during her visit to Sydney on January 20, 2012. Rotary's bid to beat the BridgeClimb's best will take place as Rotarians from more than 150 countries gather in Sydney for the 105th Rotary International Convention, which is estimated to inject more than \$60 million into the local economy.

"Rotary's partnership with BridgeClimb is expected to generate enough funds to immunize more than 240,000 children and give all visiting and local Rotarians the chance to make a real contribution to the End Polio Now campaign," Rotary International President Ron Burton said.

"We are so grateful to have BridgeClimb join us in the fight to eradicate polio. We are at a critical time as the eradication initiative focuses on stopping polio in the three countries where the virus remains endemic: Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan," President Burton said.

Rotary launched its polio immunization program PolioPlus in 1985 at the instigation of Sir Clem Renouf, from Queensland, who was then president of Rotary International. In 1988, Rotary became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication

Initiative with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since the initiative launched in 1988, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from about 350,000 cases a year to 400 confirmed so far in 2013.

## Peace Corps and Rotary kickoff historic collaboration

In an effort to promote global development and volunteer service, Rotary and Peace Corps have agreed to participate in a one-year pilot program in the Philippines, Thailand, and Togo. Under the agreement, Rotary clubs and Peace Corps volunteers are encouraged to share their resources and knowledge to boost the impact

of development projects in these three countries.

Opportunities for collaboration include supporting community projects, training, networking, and community education.

Through the Peace Corps Partnership Program, Rotary clubs can continue to provide small grants to support volunteers and their communities.

Peace Corps Acting Director Carrie Hessler-Radelet and Rotary International General Secretary John Hewko signed the letter of collaboration on Monday, 5 May, at Rotary's headquarters during a ceremony that was attended by RI President Ron Burton and RPCV Rotary staff. In his remarks to the audience, Burton applauded the collaboration and both organizations' commitments to service. "Today's announcement is particularly meaningful for me because I come from a family of Rotarians," said Hessler-Radelet, referring to her father, grandfather, and aunt. "We are eager to join together in common efforts to inspire volunteerism across the country and around the world." Hewko noted how both organizations are committed to improving lives and building stronger communities by addressing the root causes of violence and conflict, such as poverty, illiteracy, disease, and lack of access to clean water and sanitation.

The two organizations also agreed to explore expanding the collaboration to more countries based on the results of the pilot. Rotary will enlist the support of its members in recruiting Peace Corps volunteers and involving returned Peace Corps volunteers in service projects at home.

Rotary members made collaboration possible Hessler-Radelet credited Rotary members in the Denver area, particularly returned Peace Corps volunteers Sue Fox, Valerie Hopkins, and Steve Werner, with helping to make the collaboration possible. The three Rotarians, who attended the signing, are members of the District 5450 Rotary-Peace Corps Alliance Committee, which has sought a formal agreement between the two organizations since 2010.

Werner said they wanted to create an official relationship to make it easier for Rotary clubs and Peace Corps volunteers to connect. "[The letter] ensures compatibility and a shared value system," he added.

#### Strengthening connections

The letter of collaboration not only officially recognizes the partnership between the two organizations, but also encourages Rotary clubs and Peace Corps volunteers to expand the connections already in place.

In Togo, Peace Corps volunteers Daniel Brown and David Gooze have teamed up with Rotary and other partners in the United States and Togo to distribute more than 5,000 soccer balls to disadvantaged youth. They are organizing 'More Than Just a Game' sessions, which use soccer as a medium to teach children about malaria prevention.

"It's just one example of how Rotary and Peace Corps can collaborate on the ground to achieve lasting impact in the communities where we work," Hessler-Radelet said.

Within the Philippines, Thailand, and Togo, Peace Corps posts and Rotary districts will coordinate at the country level with support from the headquarters of both organizations. Local Rotary clubs interested in working with Peace Corps volunteers should contact their district governors. Clubs located elsewhere should work through their Rotary counterparts in the pilot countries.
