President's Report

Last week's speaker

Well, the quality of our guest speakers each week continues to impress! We were lucky enough to have two very inspirational and entertaining speakers join our Club this last week.

Board updates

There were a few updates I gave in my President's Report last week that I'd like to ensure all members are across:

Membership Development

Just before the Board Meeting there was a Membership Development meeting held, chaired by Committee Chair, Gulian Vaccari. At this meeting we agreed several tactics to continue to attract the right members to our Club, including: reconnecting with 'lapsed' members (recently our resigned); holding Membership Development nights (like the Rotary Means Business evening held back in May this year); and progressing the membership of those visitors that we believe will make good members. In that vein, I'm pleased to advise that we are proposing four new members at the moment. They are all being presented to the Club Membership for consideration, before we move on to induction ceremonies in the coming weeks. Great news.

Club Health Check

Many of you will remember that at the beginning of this Rotary year, one of the actions I suggested we should undertake is a self-assessment of our Club's condition using the Rotary Club Health Check Tool. Well, we finally did this as a Board during the meeting, responding to the many questions, as we believed situation to be, at 1 July 2017 (i.e. the beginning of the Rotary year). We scored 60 out of a possible 100. 60 is considered to be 'good', so we should all be proud! Our goal is to be 'great', however, and that will need a score of around 90. We now have clarity regarding what we need to do to achieve this outcome (not just a score on a spreadsheet, but a tangible improvement in Club performance). We'll make some plans, share them, and see if we can move the needle in the next 9 months. We'll do this Health Check again in June next year and I'll report our result at the Changeover presentation.

Child Protection

We have a new Child Protection Officer – Ed Dunlop. Peter van der Sleesen has held this role for the past few years, however Peter is quite busy away from Rotary at the moment and unable to give this role the time it needs. We wanted to ensure we didn't drop the ball with this important activity, and so whilst Peter will remain involved, Ed will take the lead. Thanks to both Ed and Peter for their work in the critical role in our Club.

It has come to our attention via past member Peter Foss that another past member of this club – Gerry Whalan – passed away last Thursday, 21 September 2017. Previous Guest Speaker: Dr Jill McRae

Jill was introduced by PP Peter Smith. As Jill's cousin, Peter was well equipped to provide us with a glimpse of her family background in Narrabri, summarise her extensive academic achievements - and to reflect on her passion for human rights. He highlighted her achievement in forming International Campaign for Humanitarian Relief of Syria (ICHRS) – a significant NGO whose distinguished board includes PDG Paul Sarks.

Jill began her talk by giving us an insight into her academic career, including the incredible amount of travel (to over 20 countries) that was part of her life over many years. She has numerous degrees from universities around the world, including a doctorate and two masters from Harvard.

Through connections at the World Bank, she had applied for enrolment at Harvard. In fact, the World Bank support did not eventuate, but Harvard offered her scholarships anyway! Not bad for a girl from Narrabri!

She lived in the Middle East for a considerable period, developing a deep affection for the region. Her qualifications and familiarity with the area led to a position with DFAT with whom she worked for fifteen years.

She "fell in love with Lebanon". Beirut was of special interest and she lectured in Beirut College, teaching English as a foreign language and drawing on her internationally recognised linguistic qualifications.

Jill's personal connections in the Middle East run deep and extend to members of the Jordanian royal family!

Over time she developed a strong interest in the conflict in Syria and resolved to make a contribution to improving the situation in some way.

The failure of the Geneva II Syrian Peace talks in 2014 was a turning point and led Jill, with Hadi Bourghiba, an imam from Auburn, to set up ICHRS - with the special aim of helping women, children and elderly victims of the Syrian conflict.

Jill pointed out that the demand expressed by those in need was a little unexpected.... more mobile phones! Staying in touch with relatives and friends in a war zone is important!

In fact ICHRS wishes to go well beyond phones and to establish a radio station in Jordan run, by Syrian refugees for the exclusive use of Syrians. Fundraising is underway.

Jill impressed us with her intellect and her passion for "doing good" in Syria. She showed an amazing understanding (to the extent it can be understood!) of the situation in the region and shed some light on a conflict that seems to defy logic.

\mathcal{D} o You Know? Celebrities and Projects

The procedure for a prospective member to be proposed for Rotary club membership is clearly outlined in the bylaws of Rotary. The "proposer" is the key person in the growth and advancement of Rotary. Without a sponsor, an individual will never have the opportunity to become a Rotarian.

The task of the proposer should not end merely by submitting a name to the club secretary or membership committee.

Rotary has not established formal responsibilities for proposers or sponsors, however, by custom and tradition, these procedures are recommended in many clubs. The sponsor should:

- 1. Invite a prospective member to several meetings prior to proposing the individual for membership.
- 2. Accompany the prospective new member to one or more

- orientation/informational meetings.
- 3. Introduce the new member to other club members each week for the first month.
- 4. Invite the new member to accompany the sponsor to neighbouring clubs for the first make-up meeting to learn the process and observe the spirit of fellowship.
- 5. Ask the new member and spouse to accompany the sponsor to the club's social activities, dinners or other special occasions.
- 6. Urge the new member and spouse to attend the district conference with the sponsor.
- 7. Serve as a special friend to assure that the new member becomes an active Rotarian.

When the proposer follows these guidelines, Rotary becomes stronger with each new member.
