President's Report





'Five-Percenters' in Rotary?

The term five-percenters is one coined and freely used during the past three decades in the mountains of America's west. Ninety five percent of the ever increasing millions of outdoor recreationists adhere pretty closely to a high code of ethics covering individual behaviour in the great outdoors. The other five percent are the trouble makers.

The "five-percenter" term can be applied to many things which take the joy out of everyday living.

Can we say that we have "five-percenters" in Rotary? I believe we do. You will find them among this group:

Rotarian A, who though a regular attendant has never been known to do active work on a committee; Rotarian B, who attends just often enough to keep his membership; Rotarian C, who rarely misses a meeting of his own club but seldom attends elsewhere when he travels; Rotarian D, who never stays through a meeting; Rotarian E, who believes good programs ceased when he finished his term of office as President; Rotarian F, who always is on the point of resigning because of dissatisfaction over this or that; Rotarian G, who believes he has done his share for the club: Rotarian H. who because of his affluence becomes the centre of a clique who have too large of a share of the world's goods; Rotarian I, who is always the last to pay his dues, though he has ample funds to do so; Rotarian J, who is a "concern Rotarian", all activities are carried on in the name of his company, which always pays his dues.

But perhaps rather than to exaggerate the faults and failings of the "five-percenters",

it would be better to exclaim, "God bless the Ninety-Five Percenters!"

2) Australia Day Council Celebrations

D9675 was successful in obtaining grants from the National Australia Day Council with the assistance of 6 clubs in our district. This is an Australia wide event, as other Rotary Districts are also participating.

In D9675, the largest number of clubs are participating in the delivery of our national icon, the 'lamington' to all essential workers in several locations across the District. Workers from 21 Hospitals, Police Area Command Stations, Rural Fire Brigade, and SES Centres, will receive lamingtons to say "Rotary Says Thank you" for their heroic efforts during 2020. This was judged to be the best and safest way, in these COVID times, to use the motto of the National Australian Day Council "Reflect, Respect & Celebrate".

The District has developed a COVID plan for all our Rotarians and Volunteers on the day. There are/were some other events planned but we are waiting on either an alternative event or confirmation they will proceed, due to COVID concerns. All AG's are being kept

up to date with the status of the events, so check with you AG for more information.

3) Graffiti Removal Day on Sunday 28 March 2021

For clubs based in NSW, PDG Barry Antees, (Deputy Project Manager/Volunteer Manager, Graffiti Removal Day) has written to all Councils and Shires advising them of Graffiti Removal Day on Sunday 28 March 2021.

Each year we strive to create preventative measures against repeat graffiti. Last year we had great success with murals, which have a 10–12-year life span.

This year we thought of combing Rotary's 100 years in Australia with the green preventative measure. We have informed the Councils and Shires of Rotary's celebration and have asked them to provide for free trees where Councils do their own propagation, for sites where we can remove the graffiti, plant trees in front of the walls or fences thus preventing it being re- graffitied. It is suggested that Rotary Clubs could work

with local school children and plant 100 trees at these sites as a way of celebrating 100 years, greening the planet and preventing graffiti reoccurring. Having the school children involved will have them take ownership of the project, learn about greening the planet and the fight against graffiti. The added bonus of the promotional value to clubs, is enormous.

Of course, in addition to this activity we will be working with our community volunteers and Rotary Clubs to perform our normal Graffiti Removal Day operations where we regularly remove over 30,000 square metres of graffiti each year from residential and community assets with over 2,500 volunteers.
