### LAST MEETING'S GUEST SPEAKER

The guest speaker was Matthew Campbell whose subject was "Universities Meet the Police".

Matthew was introduced by Niall King.

Matthew is an Educator in Doctoral Studies at the Catholic University in Strathfield.

Matthew works alongside Police and is involved in changing the nature of policing in the NSW Police Force. His work is part of a university program which is endeavoring to make the force a more professional organisation. The days of the big burly copper enforcing the law with his size 12's has gone – in some ways more the pity!

In the 2007 force law enforcement occupies only 10% of the police function. A substantial amount of time is spent working cooperatively with the community to reduce violence, crime and fear

One of the recommendations of the 1997 Wood Royal Commission was the instituting of a Code of Conduct for the force. This has resulted in members having clear guidelines of the conduct required to support the values of the NSW Police. These changes do not alter the expectations expected but allows them to be more clearly expressed.

Matthew spoke of the involvement of Charles Sturt University with the Police Academy at Goulburn which has resulted in changes in training procedures in as much as the training is now undertaken by academics. Recruits undertake 6 months training followed by 12 months as a Probationary Constable in the field. When they are confirmed as a Constable they have an Associate Degree. Matthew commented about the fact that what is learnt at the Academy and what is learnt in the field in the first 12 months widely varies. There is nothing like on the job training!

Matthew was thanked by PP Joe Saad.

## **DISTRICT 9690 CONFERENCE 2009**

I have received "expressions of interest" from 28 members in regard to the 2009 District Conference (Friday 7<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> March) in the Hunter valley.

We have subsequently booked rooms at the "*Grand Mercure Hunter Valley*" (formerly known as the *Tallawanta Lodge*) at Pokolbin.

Accommodation in the Pokolbin district is always little expensive. We looked at various alternatives - with the proviso that it had to accommodate us all at the same Resort, be in close proximity to the conference venue at Cypress Lakes and have disabled access etc. The cheapest was \$270 per night (3.5 stars at rear of Pokolbin Village) and the most expensive was Cypress Lakes Resort at \$440 per night. The Grand Mercure (4.5 stars) rate is \$314 per night.)

Our contractual arrangement, with the Grand Mercure, is that we are required to progressively pay deposit moneys to ensure and maintain a valid booking. The Board has agreed to temporarily fund the initial deposit of \$40 per room (28 X \$40 = \$1,120) pending reimbursement from individual members. This money has already been sent. Further funds are required in November, December and February.

To secure your accommodation you will need to indicate rather quickly (first in best dressed) of your intention to attend - and to commit to the accommodation cost as mentioned above. To simplify payment you are being asked to pay as follows: \$157 by 31 July (includes the \$40 reimbursement to Strathfield Rotary)

\$157 by 30 January 2009 (but why not pay the combined July and January instalments, of \$314, to save the bookwork!). \$314 on arrival at conference

If you are a golfer and wish to play in the Friday event (10am hit off, lunch and 2.30pm "prize time" and sausage sizzle) you may need to book in for the Thursday night – or get away very early on the Friday morning.

Please email, or telephone, Peter Smith (selectedfinance@optusnet.com.au or 9764 1082) to reserve and commit to one of the 28 rooms ASAP.

We already have firm commitments for 10 rooms - so it really is first in best dressed for the remaining 18 rooms.

The Grand Mercure Hunter Valley Gardens comprises 72 guestrooms, a selection of 4 1/2 star studio, gardens studio, spa, family rooms and suites designed to allow our guests to enjoy the ambience of relaxed luxury.

Each room is beautifully appointed and opens out to a private balcony or courtyard, taking in the wonderful Valley views and magnificent gardens surrounding the property. Guests can avail themselves of our tennis courts, resort-style swimming pool, sauna, spa, the Lodge library and many other facilities including the Hunter Valley Gardens Village and the recently launched display gardens.

Rotary International -- 1 July 2008.

In July 2008, Rotary International will implement a more comprehensive registration and login process for Member Access and other password-protected online services. The new system will improve security and provide self-service features. When the new system is fully implemented, all registered users will be able to reset their passwords and update their e-mail addresses. In addition, the new system allows Rotary to increase and improve secure online content and service to non-Rotarian constituents.

Starting July 2008, both new and existing users will be required to register, or re-register, with a unique e-mail address, password, and a secret question and answer.

If you use spam blocking software, we recommend you add secure@rotarymailings.org to your approved sender list. This will ensure that you receive e-mails that support the new self-service features.

#### **Cannon Balls**
