President's Pieces

Our guest speaker last week was Rosemary Young, National Director of Frontier Services.

Rosemary provided us with a wonderful description of the services performed by Frontier Services, together with the experiences, challenges and success stories of their work in Outback Australia.

Last Friday night, Kevin Beltrame and I attended the monthly Presidents' Meeting at Penrith. Topics covered were:

Firstly, confirmation and congratulations to PP Bill Little, who has recently won selection as District Governor Nominee for the year 2005-2006. Bill is a member of the Rotary Club of Cabramatta and has been a member of Rotary for 22 years. He has been President of Cabramatta Club twice during that time and served on many District Committees. Bill is currently assistant District Governor.

Secondly, Group Study Exchange (GSE). Alan Sweet of the Rotary Club of Padstow, has been selected to lead a team to Houston Texas, between 18th April and 18th May, 2004.

The District is currently seeking applications for team members for the Group Study Exchange program to go Houston. Applications close on 27th October and interviews will be held on 9th November, 2003.

Candidates must be aged between 25 and 40, currently employed on a full time basis, flexible and adaptable and team players, able to survive for a month on 4-6 hours sleep per night.

Thirdly, Australian Rotary Health Research Fund (ARHRF). The District has become involved in a scholarship program for indigenous medical students.

Fourthly, the District Conference 19th-21st March, 2004. Resolutions for the conference are due in November.

Fifthly, Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS). The District currently has a program running in Vila called the "Vila Central Hospital Renewal Project".

The hospital has a desperate need to replace beds. Clubs are being invited to "adopt a bed" for \$100 per year for 3 years. Clubs participating will be acknowledged by a wall plaque next to the bed.

The "Donations in Kind" project run by RAWCS is experiencing increased costs and the District is foreshadowing a possible levy of \$42 per member, in the District dues, in January 2004.

Also, Risk Management Policy was a topic. The District has adopted a

'Risk Management Policy' which all clubs and committees will be expected to abide by. have received details of the Rotary International Convention, to be held in Osaka, Japan, 23rd-26th May, 2004 This pack includes registration forms, and accommodation reservation forms. 

Last Week's Guest Speaker

Ms Rosemary Young "Frontier Services"

"Frontier Services" is an off-shoot of "Flynn of the Outback" and The Flying Doctor Service, with which it still works closely.

Haven't heard of Frontier Services? Well, Rosemary said "We do the work, not sing the song."

An organization of missionaries to remote Australia. thev qo to areas. usually, where government services, banks and everv essential support group, have already pulled out.

Advances in telecommunications have, of course, isolated people in the Outback, and elsewhere, more than they/we were previously.

Similarly, mandatory accreditation for aged care has been a disaster for aboriginal communities.

These are just two of the enormous problems the group tackles.

They don't run the facilities – they help others do it themselves.

Migrant services in W.A. in remote mining communities, is another area Rosemary's workers are found helping.

It was shocking to hear that there is organized gambling in aboriginal communities, by which she means that conmen 'do the rounds' of the remote reserves, 'fleecing' unsuspecting customers, then 'flying by night' with the takings.

'Frontier' also helps the children of fishing trawlermen, and shearers, often providing families with whom these youngsters can live so that they can get some sort of education and a few living skills.

Frontier Services has been operating, and helping, for 90 years now. They have a staff of 430, with 20 constantly patrolling ministers, who are also trained as counsellors. Out of a budget of \$20 million, they receive \$17 million from the government.

Rosemary expressed her appreciation that Strathfield Rotary Club has decided to help make up the difference by nominating Frontier Services as one of our recipients of donations this year.
