ANZAC DAY 2004 – (extract) A short history of the part played by the Parramatta River during our times of armed conflict

- Cockatoo Island Dockyard employed 2800 workers during WW1 to build and repair ships.
- 13 Corvettes were built at Mort's Dock, Balmain and Woolwich Dock was an important repair facility.
- Spectacle Island has been an Armaments depot since 1893. During WW11, 600 workers produced ammunition for all allied navies.
- Slazengers employed 80 workers at Kissing Point Bay during WW11 to build motorized wooden scows for the RAAF. They were designed to operate in the S-W Pacific.
- Steel ships were built by Tullochs of Rhodes at Brays Bay. Eleven of these 37 m long ships were built during WW11 from 1943 onwards.
- Halvorsen on the Ryde shore built fast motorized 34 m long wooden ships designed as torpedo boats & submarine chasers, known as *Fairmiles*
- In Homebush Bay lies the wreck of HMAS *Karangi* Built at Cockatoo Dock, this boom defence vessel of 971 tonnes was launched in 1941, and was in Darwin when that city was bombed on 19 February 1942.
- Sydney Harbour was attacked by 3 Japanese midget submarines on 30 may 1942. The only ship sunk was HMAS *Kuttabul*, a converted ferry being used as a hospital Ship.
- Nearing Parramatta, the stern section of the first HMAS *Parramatta* can be seen on the southern shore. The bow is on Garden Island near the memorial to those killed on HMAS *Kuttabul* HMAS *Parramatta* was a torpedo-boat destroyer which served in WW1
